Stokesay been ranked a brilliant <u>first</u> for progress in the Shropshire school league tables which were published last week. This superb achievement has come about through the very hard work and commitment of both pupils and staff.

We looked at the leagues tables in detail and they show that that:

- Shropshire has 169 primary schools.
- Stokesay is ranked first for progress in Shropshire in 2023.
- Stokesay is first place for progress in both writing and mathematics, and second place for reading.
- Also, Stokesay was ranked good fifteenth place for the achievement scores.

Mr O'Malley, Executive Headteacher said, "We are absolutely thrilled by this outcome for our school and know that the pupils and staff are very pleased with this achievement too. Congratulations to everyone!".

I feel that it is important for us as a Trust to mark this moment in Stokesay's history. Stokesay is now achieving great things and the whole school community can be rightly proud to belong to such a wonderful and successful school.

Several guests attended our special assembly including parents and governors, who were all enthusiastic in congratulating the pupils, staff, and school on this great achievement. TrustEd School Parliament


Run by Students, for our Students!
