### Barriers to Learning for disadvantaged pupils in our school

#### Academic barriers:

- Language and communication skills tend to be lower for children who are eligible for Pupil Premium than for other pupils
- This gap in language and communication skills impacts across the curriculum and affects progress in Reading vocabulary and comprehension, writing skills and other curriculum areas
- Progress in mathematics, particularly reasoning skills partly as a result of language and vocabulary knowledge, partly due to attendance leading to gaps in learning

#### Additional barriers:

- Emotional resilience especially post lockdown which impacts on pupils' ability to focus on learning
- Limited access to extra-curricular activities including educational experiences (trips and visits), music lessons and some extra-curricular sporting opportunities
- Attendance and punctuality a greater proportion of children eligible for the Pupil Premium require support to maintain a good level of attendance and some require support to ensure they arrive at school on time
- Some children who are eligible for Pupil Premium do not have the appropriate resources to access or support home learning
- Impact of Covid-19 regulations on the flexibility and adaptability of staffing and school organisation which may impact on our ability to meet needs in the most effective manner
- Impact of school closure due to Covid-19 leading to 'missed' educational and social opportunities

- To maintain our commitment to the development of Quality First Teaching skills
- To reduce the difference in progress and attainment between children eligible for the Pupil Premium and other children
- To provide early intervention where necessary
- To ensure all children have a positive attitude to learning and show resilience
- To ensure all Pupil Premium children attend school in line with non-Pupil Premium children
- To enhance the extra-curricular opportunities in order
